Open and Equal Access to the Internet - Under Challenge

Concerning the current threat to open and equal access to the internet, <http://www.SaveTheInternet.com> is a good place to learn more and to take action to protect Net Neutrality. Also www.alternet.org. Here are two key questions:

How is an open internet an essential part of your life?

Most of us rely on the Internet as a public platform for

free speech, equal opportunity, economic growth and innovation. Without vital Net Neutrality protections, companies such as Verizon and Comcast, which have a commercial incentive to limit the free-flowing web information, can decide who will have a voice online. These companies should not have the power to determine our access to and participation in the internet.

Why must the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) act now to protect Net Neutrality?

The FCC can't cut private deals that would hand control over the internet to a few massive phone and cable companies. Any compromise that allows internet providers to build toll lanes online is not real Net Neutrality.

The agency must stand with the public and protect consumer access to the most important communications medium of our time. The FCC must regain its resolve to protect Net Neutrality on wired and wireless networks. We must ask them to reclassify broadband as a "telecommunications service" and keep the internet open and free of corporate gatekeepers.
